**Dear Parents and Guardians,**

In my remarks at the first assembly of the new year, I spoke about the values that bind us as part of the UWC movement, peace, sustainability, and mutual understanding. At a time when the world can feel increasingly fractured and uncertain, these principles are not abstract ideals, but practical commitments. They call on us to be brave enough to engage in challenging conversations, wise enough to listen deeply across difference, and thoughtful enough to act with empathy and compassion.

I also reflected on the importance of empathy and kindness as forms of leadership within our community, not loud or performative, but quiet, intentional, and deeply consequential. These qualities are too often absent from today's political discourse, yet they remain central to the way we live and learn together at UWC Robert Bosch College. As we settle into the rhythm of the new term, it is remarkable to reflect on all that has been accomplished in just two and a half weeks. Our first-year students have embarked on their Theory of Knowledge (TOK) journey and begun to consider ideas for their Extended Essays, while second-year students have submitted their TOK essays and are now focused on next steps. For some, this includes working on university applications, while for others it involves careful planning for the year ahead as they prepare for life beyond RBC. Time at RBC really does seem to have its own unique pace.

**Looking Ahead**

- **Global Affairs (Wednesday 21 Feb)** entitled "Neurodiversity" which will include testimonials from members of the RBC community.
- **Special Focus Day (Thursday 29 Jan):** Our second Special Focus Day, centered on Peace and Conflict. This day will provide students with the opportunity to engage thoughtfully with our four peacebuilding pillars: *Peace with Self*, *Peace with Others*, *Peace within the Community*, and *Peace with the Environment*. Through a range of workshops, the community will participate in discussion-based

sessions exploring peace- and conflict-related issues, skills-based workshops developing practical peacebuilding skills, and action-based activities involving creative and hands-on peacebuilding initiatives.

- **Project Week (Sunday 1 February – Friday 6 February)** will see students engaging in a wide range of meaningful and enriching activities. While some groups will remain in Freiburg, others will travel by bus and train within Germany or elsewhere in Europe. Throughout the week, students will take part in service projects such as supporting people experiencing homelessness and other vulnerable members of society, contributing to the Stolpersteine Project here in Freiburg, as well as creative and experiential projects in photography, painting, and theatre.

  1. **Spring Break:**
    - Spring Break begins on **Thursday, 2 April**. Students must remain on campus through their final commitment/class on **Wednesday, 1 April** but may depart afterward.

    - **Student Arrival:** Thursday, 27 August 2026 (Incoming flights to Frankfurt will be met by prior arrangement. Students arriving at Basel Airport should take the airport bus to Freiburg train station. Similarly, students arriving in Freiburg by train or bus will be met by prior arrangement.)
    - **Winter Holiday Departure:** By 10 a.m., Friday, 18 December 2026
    - **Winter Holiday Return:** Campus opens at 10 a.m.; students must return by 7 p.m., Sunday, 10 January 2027
    - **Departure of Y2 students:** By 12 p.m., Friday 21 May 2027
    - **Summer Holiday Departure for First-Year Students:** By 10 a.m., Friday, 18 June 2027
